Secretary Thorne WØJGT, read the minutes of the September 9 meeting; they were approved as corrected (next meeting date is October 14).

Texas County is running emergency exercises this weekend. It will be an earthquake simulation on Saturday,

October 18 at 2:00 p.m. on 3.963 mHz frequency.

Don KMØR, is working on the repeater. He needs to take 146.76 repeater off the air and will ask Mac to change his repeater to 146.76 when the work takes place. He recommends some component replacement

Bob KØYBN moved, 2nd Don NØUBC, to approve ~\$150 for channel elements for 440 repeater repair. Motion carried.

Wes ABØSE, moved, 2nd Dan, KCØUTW, that meeting adjourn. Motion carried at 7:40 p.m.
